Local Community

The City of Zachary is a growing community. At just over 16,000 residents, Zachary maintains an independent and significantly rural identity while both being a part of East Baton Rouge Parish (county) and being relatively close to downtown Baton Rouge. This gives residents access to the full offerings of the East Baton Rouge park system (BREC), the Library System and many other city/parish amenities while at the same time permitting the Zachary Community School System to thrive as an entity separate from the other school systems of the region. The community has had a steady growth of shops, grocery stores and other

retail stores both large and small such that surrounding communities come to Zachary to shop. In addition to the many things that can be found in Zachary, the many opportunities of Baton Rouge are a short drive away.

Zachary has seen sustained growth over the past decade for many reasons, including the fact that its <u>independent school system</u> has been ranked as #1 in the state for the past 11 years in a row. The community enjoys an annual Christmas in the

History

On March 17, 1957 a group of 18 people signed a petition to request that the Episcopal Diocese of Louisiana approve a mission station in Zachary, Louisiana. Fittingly, the mission was named St. Patrick's Episcopal Church.

In 1976, the church moved to its current location when Dr. Howard Martin donated 2.56 acres of land to the church in memory of his late wife,

Susan. During that time, St. John the Baptist Catholic Church was constructing a new sanctuary and offered their old church building to St.



Patrick's. Making headlines, the building was transported by truck down the street to the current location.



In 2014, a major renovation and expansion project began on the historic church building. This project repaired and modernized the building, as well as doubled the capacity. The new church opened its doors on February 8, 2015. An indepth history can be found on our church webpage.

Outreach

St. Patrick's biggest ministry is the day school which has helped hundreds of families both from the parish and community. St. Patrick's has supported many community and church activities including an ongoing mission to provide pastoral support to St. Augustine's Episcopal Church in the nearby city of Central. Lay ministries of the Church include Cub Scout Pack 46, Boy Scout Troop 46, Zachary Food Bank, Christmas Angel Tree Project, Relay for Life, Lakota Indian Reservation, Zachary Schools Uniform Program and Oakwood Village Assisted Living.

St. Patrick's Day School

St. Patrick's Episcopal Day School was opened for Preschool Mother's Day Out Christian based program three days a week in August of 1987 with one class of seven children under the direction of Beth Kimmell. Over the years, classes have been added for six month olds, one and two year olds, extended care for elementary children and a summer camp program for all children. The school serves approximately 150 children every day.
